### OUR GUIDING PHILOSOPHY

We strive to charge \$0 submission fee and \$0 article processing charge (APC). Because the author pays \$0 while JEAMS pays for all of the financial burdens of publishing a journal, the author will be asked to allow JEAMS to own the copyright of the published paper in order to somehow derive future revenues from subscriptions, advertising, etc..

### PUBLISHING AGREEMENT

Before the laborious peer review process is started, all authors are required to complete and submit a Publishing Agreement that is part of the journal's electronic Authorship Form. In this agreement, authors will transfer copyright with a Copyright Transfer Agreement (CTA) or an exclusive publication license with an Exclusive License Agreement (ELA); or indicate that they are employed by a federal government; or indicate that they are an employee of an institution that considers the work in the manuscript a work for hire, in which case an authorized representative of that institution will assign copyright or a publication license on the author's behalf.

In the case of a CTA or ELA, the corresponding author would receive the document directly from JEAMS.

### UNAUTHORIZED USE

Published manuscripts become the permanent property of the publisher, the Epsilon Alpha Mu Society (EAM), and may not be published elsewhere without written permission. Unauthorized use of the journal's name, logo, or any content for commercial purposes or to promote commercial goods and services (in any format, including print, video, audio, and digital) is not permitted by the EAM or JEAMS.

### OPTIONAL \$5,000 REVIEW FEE

It is possible for an author to retain the copyright.

In this scenario, the author / lab / institution would pay the optional \$5,000 review fee. This simple transparent pricing is based upon the range of fees charged by many other journals, esp. open access e-journals. This \$5,000 would be a flat fee that includes color figures, Supplemental Information (SI), etc.. JEAMS would then complete the peer review, and an approved manuscript would complete the statistical review, copy editing, and publication process.

This optional fee is paid when authors and readers pay nothing while the small publisher pays upfront for all publication costs with zero opportunities to generate revenues on the backend, since that isn't a sustainable or equitable business model. Just because some funder pays an investigator to conduct research, that doesn't mean everybody else in the world must work for free to create a literary asset for unpaid readers. Which commercial printer will print those issues for free? Which U.S. post office will mail those issues for free? Even for e-journals, who will pay the database programmer, web developer, magazine layout design specialist, graphic artist, medical illustrator, statistician, copy editor, etc.? Where will that money come from? Why does the small publisher become responsible to pay that upfront, then risk failing to recover the costs from donors and advertisers?

Authors who are unwilling to pay publishers while still retaining the copyright are welcome to self-publish by uploading manuscripts on their personal blogs and school webpages. Good luck finding funders, employers, and admissions committees which trust manuscripts where the science escaped vetting by peer reviewers, where the data and its analysis circumvented ethical and statistical review, where the writing avoided grammar checking, proofreading, and copy editing, and where the publication bypassed the editorial process of an independent third party publisher. Alternatively, an author is welcome to wait the typical 1 to 2 years to get published in a different high impact journal, esp. when there is no rush to get published before a competitor scientist publishes first, or before the author graduates or completes a postdoc or medical residency or visiting professorship, etc..
